Four graduating seniors and two alumni have been voted to Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society by the faculty of the college. The seniors are: Gretchen Gallagher of Fort Wayne, Bob Liechty of Berne, Kenneth Mays of Fort Wayne, and Dave Stout of Mooresville. The alumni are: Loyal R. Ringenberg of Grabill, and Gordon Neuenschwander of Berne. Delta Epsilon Chi is a national honorary society sponsored by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges.

To become eligible for membership, seniors must maintain a grade point average of 3.3 or better and must have exhibited strong Christian character and leadership ability. Honorary membership for alumni is based on outstanding intellectual achievement and Christian character. Alumni nominees must wait 10 years after graduation.

Loyal Ringenberg received his diploma from F.W.B.C. in 1928. He received his AB from Taylor, MA from Winona Lake School of Theology, and Master of Theology from Wino-

Says Sugden, 'We believe that for such a time as this there needs to be 1) An Authoritative Message, 2) An Adorned Life, and 3) An Advancement in Godliness.' Development of these three ideas in the lives of both graduates and all other Christians would lead to the edification of our hearts.

Speakers for the evening sessions include Dr. Henry Brant, a Psychologist with the Missionary Internship program in Detroit, Dr. S.A. Witmer, President of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, and Past-President of F.W.B.C., Professor W. Howard Schoof, Dean of Students at Detroit Bible Institute, and Dr. Jared F. Gerig, President of F.W.B.C.

Workshop sessions will emphasize teaching general psychology and music appreciation. The psychology seminar will be led by Dr. Claude R. Rickman, Dean of Central Wesleyan College of Central, South Carolina. The music appreciation seminar will be led by Dr. Rene Frank, Director of the F.W.B.C. School of Music.


