

FWBC Grad Honored for Advocacy for Racial Reconciliation

r. William E. "Bill" Pannell g51 is known for his advocacy for racial reconciliation and for African Americans and Latinos in ministry.

On January 27, Fuller Theological Seminary, where he was the first African American to serve on their board, renamed its African-

American Church Studies Center program in his honor.

The program has been in existence for 40 years and equips young men and women to minister within African American communities in the 21st century.

"They won't limit that to the African American community, of course, but this whole area of church life has changed radically," Dr. Pannell said, "There's a

whole new tribe of young people who need help to come to terms with their understanding of the church. It's a whole other ball game."

Dr. Pannell chose the Fort Wayne Bible College because his pastor's sons attended there, so his pastor encouraged him to enroll as well.

Dr. Pannell remembers that conversation well: "I remember questioning my pastor, "Why would I want to go to Bible school? I don't know anything about the Bible.' He said, "That's probably a good reason."" So, Dr. Pannell went to FWBC to study the Bible and to prepare for ministry. He credits FWBC for giving him a "good foundation" on which to begin his ministry. Yet, he quickly adds that "what really made it for me were the relationships. The exposure to classmates and their lives and experiences,

hopes and fears—all of that is what really makes a school. That's what life itself is all about." Among his classmates in the Class of 1951 was **Dr. Wes Gerig g51**, the cherished and now-retired Bible professor.


After he graduated from FWBC, Dr. Pannell was involved in evangelistic work as a song leader and soloist and eventually as a preacher from 1951 to 1974. Through his ministry with Youth for Christ, Pannell connected with several

people who were on the board of trustees at Fuller Theological Seminary. After meeting the president of Fuller in Berlin, Pannell was invited to serve on Fuller's board of trustees. Then in 1974 he became a member of the teaching faculty, serving as a preaching professor and the dean of the chapel.

"In those days, you couldn't find anywhere in the country someone who had a PhD in evangelism," Dr. Pannell said. "That wasn't considered an academic field. If you were

going to do something crazy like that, you'd do a doctorate in sociology. The seminary had

the good sense to hire someone on the faculty who had 20 to 25 years of experience in evangelism. That's something you can't get in the classroom."

Dr. Pannell was a faculty professor at Fuller until he retired about 10 or 15 years ago, although he says he never fully retired.

"It's very difficult to retire from a lifetime of working Enemy in 1968 with people. It's easier to retire, I suspect, from making a Ford, or a machine. I keep hanging around. When our presidents changed, they asked me to serve as his assistant, and I still preach occasionally here in the area churches."


Dr. Pannell served on the Taylor University board of trustees from 1990 to 1999. As an "emeritus" member and alumnus, he now stays in touch with the Fort Wayne Alumni Center as much as possible. He and his wife, Hazel,

do not travel as much anymore, but he was grateful for the opportunity to visit the Fort

Wayne campus last September for Homecoming. During that visit, Dr. Pannell participated in an interviewstyle discussion regarding college, church, and culture with his friend and former Taylor president Dr. Jay Kesler g58. He expressed his longtime appreciation for the Fort Wayne campus and all that it's meant to him over the years:

"I didn't know the extent of how much I felt at home here, how much I missed it... this campus with our alumni is under the powerful

impact of a living history, a legacy that simply will not go away."

Strahm Continues Lifelong Advocacy for Students

Sonja Strahm g66 knows what it's like to strive and scramble. Her life has included a series of unexpected turns that have given her a heart for advocating for others. "If you know what it's like to struggle, you have a better chance at helping others," Strahm explained.

For example, Strahm graduated from Taylor University in 1966, but as a student on scholarship, she had reached a point at the end of her sophomore year where she didn't think she'd make it through college.

Because of her English professor's help; however, Strahm went on to graduate—and then went on to earn two master's degrees in English and education, and certifications as a developmental education specialist and in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). It was that experience that led Strahm into working with and championing struggling students. Strahm taught junior high in the Fort Wayne Community Schools for 10 years when she decided she wanted to do something new. She was interested in moving to Ecuador to teach English.

At the time, Strahm was also a part-time faculty instructor at Fort Wayne Bible College, teaching composition in the evenings. She applied for the teaching position in Ecuador and asked God to open the doors to the next step in her career.

"The FWBC dean came into the mailroom and said, 'We've been thinking about having a full-time English position at the college," Strahm recalled. "Tr's not approved yet, but we're thinking about asking you."

She was open to the Lord's leading. "I



said, 'It's in the Lord's hands. Whatever opens up, that's where I'm going." She never left the campus until 2009.

At TUFW Strahm was able to foster her passion for helping struggling students. When Taylor University acquired the Fort Wayne campus in 1992, Strahm asked them to develop an academic learning center. "They said, "What? You want to go from being a classroom teacher to doing this?" But for Strahm, given her experiences, this career move made perfect sense.

Some of Strahm's strategies included developing students' organizational and time

management skills, understanding their learning style and how it fit in with the teaching style, and helping them finish homework.

"One of my successes was a young man

from the east coast," Strahm said. "He was in his late 20s or early 30s, and he had an awful time with school. I taught him how to use the dictionary. He could never pronounce words or spell words correctly. But he went on to be a pastor. He was such a testimony [to the program]. He really struggled, but he was able to get into the ministry and have an impact on people. He was a young man I had a lot of respect for."

Earlier in her tenure, Strahm taught art history and drama and also founded the touring drama group, HIS Company. The acronym "HIS" stands for "Honoring In Service." (For more on HIS Company, see page 11.) Strahm's deep love of art drew her to drama, and she thrived on connecting the two and using them for ministry in churches.

"I saw there was a need for churches to use drama," she said. "Lots of people have musical ability, but I never had that growing up. One way I got involved was through scriptural interpretation."

In an interesting twist, Strahm also had the opportunity to return to Ecuador co-leading a TWO team with Michael Mortensen g91 in 2007.

"That was a wonderful trip for me," she

said. "Thad the opportunity to read Through Gates of Splendor [by Elisabeth Elliot], and I also had the opportunity to go by plane into the jungle where that book had taken place and sit in a village

his wife and tell them how Jesus died for you and me."

Since 2009, Strahm continued her advocacy through teaching by working with Taylor's Summer Clubhouse program (supported by the Foellinger Foundation) for kindergarten through fourthgrade students. She also was the TESOL chair at Ivy Tech until she retired last May. Since then, she has served on the board of the Literary Alliance of Allen County. She also teaches composition and event planning, and tutors part-time at Crossroads Bible College, which offers classes on the former Fort Wayne campus.

Couple Advocates for Orphaned Special Needs Children

aul g02 and Ashley (Bandy) g03
Kellogg met in professor Laura
Gerig's g91 Child Psychology
class and never imagined how that class
would come to define their life together and
advocacy for children.

"We always joked how we met in Child Psychology class. It ended up being what we needed," Ashley said.

The TUFW couple now has five children, including one with a disability, and is in the process of adopting two children with special needs from China. Ashley said the foundation of child development, child psychology, and education she received at TUFW has prepared her and Paul to be able to care for the children God has given them.

Paul is a third-grade teacher at Franke Park Elementary in Fort Wayne. Ashley is a stay-at-home mom and a doula. The Kelloggs' biological children are Kyler, 12; Gracelyn, 10; Brynnan, 8; Ezekiel, 6; and Myra, 5.

When Ashley went into labor with Myra, everything was fine until her water broke. "I noticed there was a problem right away," Ashley said. "Myra's heart rate wasn't great. I ended up with an emergency C-section, and Myra was not born alive. It took the doctors 10 minutes to resuscitate her. She had a lack of oxygen, and she was in the hospital for 30 days. She had several surgeries."

Myra was eventually diagnosed with

cerebral palsy and a seizure disorder. She is hearing and vision-impaired and has some major developmental delays. Ashley said, "She doesn't speak. She does a few signs. She can't hold her head up all the way, and she can't walk. It's been a challenge, but we've learned a lot."

When Ezekiel, their fourth child, was born in 2009, the Kelloggs started the process of becoming foster parents because they wanted more children. They were denied, so they decided to hold off and try again later.

"We decided to wait a few years until the kids got older," Ashley said, "but we were denied just a few months before Myra was born. It turned out to be a blessing in disguise."

In 2013, the Kelloggs reapplied to be foster parents but found out the state of Indiana had a maximum number of five children allowed in the home, and they were denied again.

"They told us we couldn't foster, but we could adopt," Ashley said. "So, we applied for more than 25 sibling groups. No one took us seriously, no one called us back."

Their case worker told them, "They're never going to take you seriously with as many kids as you have and only one income. But there are tons of kids across the world who have special needs, just not in America."

At the time, Ashley was convinced she didn't want to adopt a child from overseas. "We



didn't have money, and I wasn't interested," she said, "so we put it on the back burner. Eventually, God made it very clear through people and circumstances that's where He wanted us."

As they prayed, they found Frannie, a four-year-old girl from China with Down syndrome.

Then after starting this process, Ashley also was drawn to a picture of a two-year-old albino boy.

"My heart was always to adopt two kids under five," Ashley said. "But with China, it's crazy expensive. I thought, If God brings in the money quickly when we get our paperwork in China, maybe we can get a second child."

But Paul wasn't as quick to go along with the idea because of the cost—\$50,000. Ashley thought that they should name the two children Frannie and Finn. Later, when she looked up the name Finton, she found out it meant "light hair" or "white fire." She knew it was no coincidence that this little boy would be named Finn.

"We were both hooked from that moment on," Ashley said.

Ashley will travel with her mom to China for three weeks at the end of June to pick-up Frannie and Finn. Paul will stay with their other children at home. Perhaps, when all is said and done, the Kelloggs will be able to write a textbook on raising seven children, three of which have special needs, on one income while raising nearly \$44,000 in 10 months.
