n accident on June 27, 1933, nearly forever changed our lives, but most of us were not yet born.

According to the *Journal Gazette*, Wesley Lee Gerig, the three-year-old son of the **Rev. Jared g29** and **Mrs. Mildred (Eicher g28) Gerig**, then of Cleveland, OH, ran out into the road while waiting for his **Uncle Cyril g32** and **Mildred**

(Neuenschwander g34)
Eicher's wedding party. He was struck by a truck in Grabill, IN, and rushed to Lutheran Hospital. At that time, the hospital was located just up the road from where Dr. Wes g51 and Mary Carolyn (Steiner g52) Gerig would eventually raise their family at 4030 South Wayne Avenue!

The newspaper headline read, "Son of Jared Gerig Thought Fatally Injured." After all, he suffered critical injuries to his head, a broken left leg, and other injuries when the truck passed over his body, according to the paper.

Can you imagine how your life might have been different if his young life had ended that day?

Who might have guessed then what God would do with Dr. Wes' life?

It took a week for the doctors to express hope for survival.

In 1952 Dr. Wes married Mary Carolyn, who much later in life often carried his briefcase to his office before she reported for work in the college bookstore.

Together, they ministered to students, both on-campus and in their home, where students were invited to come for dessert and fellowship.

Along with raising their four children, Jeannie (Johnson g78), John g81, Jeff g84, and Jerry g89, Mary Carolyn often ventured away with him from campus,

as he traveled and lectured in Israel and other Middle Eastern countries; the Caribbean islands of Jamaica, Haiti, and the Dominican Republic; as well as Ecuador. Later, in 1983, Dr. Wes traveled and spoke in Japan, Taiwan, and the Philippines.

In addition to his teaching, Dr. Wes pastored

Son of Jared Gerig Thought Fatally Injured

Wesley Lee, three -year-old son of Rev. and Mrs. Jared Gerig of Cleveland was probably fatally injured at Grabill Wednesday evening when a truck ran over the child. The Gerig's are well known here.

Following the wedding of Cyril Eicher to Miss Mildred Neuenschwander at Fort Wayne the wedding party left for a dinner at Grabill at the home of the bride's parents.

Shortly after a truck struck the lad and the boy sustained a crushed head and fractured leg and other injuries. He is at the Lutheran hospital at Ft. Wayne and according to word received here today little hope is held for his recovery.



Tribute to Wes Geria continued

for 11 years as "Interim" at Harvester Avenue Missionary Church, Fort Wayne, IN. From 1989 to May 1991, he also served as the interim Senior Pastor of First Missionary Church, Fort Wayne, IN. He served again in this capacity at First Missionary in 1994-95.

Throughout the same time period, he ministered as an interim pastor at First Missionary Church, Berne, IN; Grace Missionary Church, Celina, OH; Grace Community Church, Lima, OH; and the First Christian Church, Kendallville, IN. During the summers of 1989, 1991, and 1996, he pastored Karuizawa Union Church in Karuizawa, Japan; and later in 1994, he pastored the Kurume Bible Fellowship in Tokyo.

After his interim assignments, while continuing to teach on the Fort Wayne campus, he taught Sunday School and Wednesday evening services for multiple congregations. He always wanted 50 minutes, and he often used his signature overhead projector and "hand" pointer.

In spite of walking with a limp, later a cane, and then ultimately riding a motor scooter after his leg was amputated at the knee, Dr. Wes did not slow his pace (unless he was driving a car, not past 55 mph!).

During these years, Dr. Wes served as one of the translators of the New International Version of the New Testament. He worked mainly on the Gospel of Mark and the Epistle to the Hebrews.

He would faithfully get up between 4:30 and 5:00 each morning to devote his time to his prayer list and the study of God's word. His teaching and preaching format typically included alliteration and lists, which he trusted to help students and congregants remember his materials. In the same way and for the same purpose, in his assignments, he requested lists in "noun" form (many times to

the dismay of his students, who spent hours trying to figure out how to change adjectives and verbs into nouns!).

In "retirement," he was driven to write, so others who were not able to take his classes or who needed a refresher could pick up one of his books. Your Fort Wayne Alumni Center

In 2012, Mary Carolyn received her eternal reward, and Dr. Wes moved soon after to Ashton Creek Retirement Center, where he kept teaching. He taught a Friday class at 3 p.m., which many times was visited by alumni and friends. He also preached the Sunday morning service at least once a month. Of course, his overhead and pointer were his constant companions, even though I don't believe "noun form," "others, please," or "heresy" were ever stamped on those papers.

Dr. Wes taught his Friday afternoon class at Ashton Creek until two weeks before he entered His heavenly reward on Sunday, June 9, 2019, surrounded by his family.

All of our lives were touched by this man whose walk was different than most, and this man whose life God preserved has made all the difference in our lives.

"I was always impressed by his focus on APPLICATION. It was of course important to get the correct meaning of a scripture passage and Dr. Wes was good at that, but Bible knowledge without application



to everyday life is of limited value. Dr. Wes lived what he taught.

When several of us in the Bible Department went down to IU at Bloomington to hear a well-known Israeli archaeologist, somewhere along the way we stopped at a McDonald's for lunch. Dr. Wes ordered a Happy Meal, not knowing that it was particularly for children. We had a great time asking him what toy he got with the meal and of course never failed to tease him many times thereafter about that incident to his chagrin."

"Dr. Wes taught me the importance of work. He was a workhorse being about his father's business.' He graded more papers than any prof I have ever known. He taught me to strive for excellence and the importance of prayer."



On a lighter note, "At a faculty retreat we played a game with candy. Starting with 20 candies one would add when positive and subtract candies when negative. One question said, 'If you have ever had a speeding ticket, come forward and put 5 candies in the dish.' When I went forward, there was Dr. Wes. I said, 'Dr. Wes what are you doing up here?' He said, 'Pomona, CA, 1954, and I did not deserve it."'

While we had fewer reunions this year in part because of the significant relocation

CELEBRATE

Focusing on 2020 and Beyond

s we look at a new decade of ministry, your Alumni Center staff, core volunteers, and Alumni Council did a comprehensive review of our first decade of ministry.

Many of these accomplishments have been featured in past publications, Facebook, and on our website. It truly is remarkable to see what we have been able to accomplish with fewer resources than when we began. Yet God has been faithful, staff and volunteers loyal, and ministry partners supportive. To God, be the Glory!

After looking back, we turned our attention forward to the next decade. After all, we want to be wise stewards with God's resources that He provides through you. From the middle of August through September 26, alumni completed a four-question survey to help us evaluate our ministry as we move into a new decade.

You spoke, and we listened, especially before deciding to relocate again (story on page 8).

"We were very encouraged by the participation, sample, and responses," **Michael Mortensen g91**, director of Fort Wayne Alumni and Friend Relations, said. "It was the largest response we have had to a survey in our history. The responses came in proportion to the percentages of alumni for each campus name grouping back to the 1940s."

"Alumni shared how important the ministry of the Alumni Center is as we care, connect and celebrate the work that God continues to do through our alumni and friends," Sari (Pafford) Harris g88, president of the Alumni Association, expressed.

AND, THE SURVEY SAYS...

88% said the Alumni Center overall is very important or important.

80% said the *FW Vine* is either very important or important.

77% said the *FW Falcon* e-newsletter is very important or important.

67% said the website (www.fwalumnicenter. org) is important.

65% said Facebook presence is important.

60% said reunions are important.

In contrast, only 37% said specialty reunions are important.

58% said a physical location is very important or important.

46% said they would likely or very likely attend a webinar.

29% said they would very likely or some what likely attend a virtual reunion.

41% said they would come to a Taylor sponsored-non-fundraising alumni event (10% said they were unsure).

Alumni then ranked the following topics of interest in priority order: professors, musical groups/extra-curricular activities, staff, campus buildings, and then athletic teams and events. This will help guide our work moving forward.

Lastly, 126 alumni wrote comments. Most gave thanks for the work of the Center, the staff, and volunteers, while others made constructive suggestions that we are considering. "The survey results clearly communicated that we still have a call to answer and work that God intends for us to do," Sari explained.



Fourth, we plan to try some new things


through technology to engage alumni, no matter their location.

organized. Then in 1921, they built their present sanctuary.

Since that time, First Missionary Church and the Fort Wayne Campus have partnered together, often sharing space.

Many students attended First Missionary, where several faculty members taught, pastored, or attended.

Then in the 2000s, students started attending chapel in the sanctuary on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings at 10 a.m., until 2008.

Most recently, First Missionary gave your Alumni Center permission to lease space in the Welty Education Building (WEB), located just east of the historic church building. This once served as the Missionary Church denominational headquarters.

After our move to the WEB in May 2019, the church decided to sell the Welty Building due to the cost of repairs on this additional building.

Where would we go? We wanted to remain near our beloved former campus.

Once again, First Missionary opened its doors for us to lease renovated space on the south side of the building on the main floor.

Our new location formerly was **Susi** (Laymon) Jones' g71 Children's Music Room, but she graciously offered to move across the hall so that our ministry would have a space.

"We are excited about the newly

renovated space," Stephanie (Cox) Demorest g93, explained. "It's larger than our current space in the WEB, it requires no stairs, and it is close to the parking area. Additionally, we'll be able to host some of our future alumni events in the same area as our office."

A few Taylor football players and their dad will help us move, and we hope to be up and

running by the first of the year, if not sooner. Our move depends on the church completing some extensive remodeling they have undertaken in their main building this past Fall.

During the October meeting of the Alumni Council, some members of the Council and Alumni Center staff toured the new space while it was under construction to pray for the new location.

Alumna Overcomes Debt, Publishes First Book

After **Heather** (Neilson) Burgette **g04** graduated from Taylor University Fort Wayne (TUFW), she ended up accumulating a lot more debt



than she could handle. She moved to California for a few years, and when she returned to her home state of Indiana, she was a "hot mess."

"I went bonkers financially," she said. "As I was adjusting to adult life, I made a lot of bad choices with my money. Some of them were actual emergencies, but I spent frivolously."

With a lot of hard work and discipline, in 2014, Heather and her husband, Blake, finally finished paying off their debt. She decided to start a Facebook group called "Becoming Debt Free" to help others on their debt-free journey.

"Something like that would have been helpful when we were starting out," she said. "I wanted others to have resources and support."

Heather then started a blog called "The Debt-Free Mama" at www.
HeatherBurgette.com, in which she began writing about her journey out of debt.
This Fall, Heather self-published her first book, Unlock Your Why: 7 Keys to a Thriving Relationship with Money.

"It's very humbling that God uses our mistakes—for those called according to His purpose, for our good—to inspire other people," she said. "My heart is to get it in as many hands as possible."
